Changing By The Minute: Bonus Clips

Discussion Guide for Professional Development with Educators, Administrators, New Teachers and Teacher Candidates

CBTM Bonus Clips are intended to augment and extend discussions related to the 62 min. documentary film "Changing By the Minute." These Bonus Clips are not a comprehensive presentation of issues — but an assortment of commentary, anecdotes, and insights that may be of additional interest.

The documentary "Changing By The Minute" follows students through one year in an unconventional public middle school, highlighting essential issues in early adolescent development and middle grade education. Discussion guides are available for using the film with current educators, teacher candidates, after school/out of school staff, and directly with early adolescents.
